



## Jotham and Ahaz: You Reap What You Sow

### Lesson 17

*“Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap...” Galatians 6:7*

Actions have consequences, and what you sow is what you will reap.

#### Jotham – 2 Chronicles 27

- I. Jotham was a \_\_\_\_\_ king (2 Chronicles 27:1-2).
  - A. He refused to enter the \_\_\_\_\_ like his father had.
  - B. He did allow pagan worship \_\_\_\_\_ the temple.  
While he personally did what was right, he didn’t clamp down on the corruption of the people. His son would be led away, likely by some of these very same people.
  
- II. Jotham saw God’s \_\_\_\_\_ (2 Chronicles 27:3-6).
  - A. Jotham succeeded \_\_\_\_\_ (3-4).
  - B. Jotham succeeded \_\_\_\_\_ (5).
  - C. God’s \_\_\_\_\_ was due to Jotham’s obedience (6).  
We do find here a general principle that is true throughout all of Scripture: obedience brings blessing.
  
- III. Jotham saw the beginning of \_\_\_\_\_ (2 Kings 15:37).  
Jotham sees Syria and Israel start to attack. However, he wouldn’t be the king to have to deal with them. His son Ahaz would.

#### Ahaz – 2 Kings 16; 2 Chronicles 28

- I. Ahaz acted wickedly (2 Kings 16:1-4; 10-18; 2 Chronicles 28:1-4, 22-25).

Whereas Israel had been ruled by good kings for the past few generations, a wicked king comes to the throne at one of the scariest moments in the history of Judah!

- A. He worshipped \_\_\_\_\_ (2 Chronicles 28:2-4).
- B. He sacrificed his \_\_\_\_\_ (2 Chronicles 28:3).
- C. He \_\_\_\_\_ high places (2 Chronicles 28:25).
- D. He \_\_\_\_\_ the worship of the Lord (2 Kings 16:10-15).

Ahaz sought to “update” the Temple.

**II. Ahaz sought the help of \_\_\_\_\_ rather than God (2 Kings 16:5-9; 2 Chronicles 28:16-21; Isaiah 7:1-6).**

God brought trials to try and get him to return to the Lord. Sadly, rather than turn to God, Ahaz simply hardened in his sinful ways.

- A. Pekah, king of Israel, and Rezin, king of Syria, attacked Ahaz (2 Chronicles 28:5-15; 2 Kings 16:5-6).
- B. God challenged Ahaz to \_\_\_\_\_ Him (cf Isaiah 7:8-17).  
Isaiah sees through Ahaz’s façade and tells him God himself will give a sign: a virgin will conceive and give birth.
- C. Ahaz sought Assyria’s \_\_\_\_\_ (2 Chronicles 28:16-21; 2 Kings 16:7-9).

While initially successful, this proved disastrous in the end.

**III. Ahaz became more \_\_\_\_\_ as his life fell apart (2 Chronicles 28:19-21, 2 Kings 16:10-18).**

- A. Ahaz’s \_\_\_\_\_ failed him (2 Chronicles 28:19-21).
- B. Ahaz \_\_\_\_\_ the gods of his enemies hoping they would save him (2 Chronicles 28:22-23).

It can be easy to roll our eyes at Ahaz, until we begin to realize that we are looking in a mirror. Far too often we too continue down sinful paths, trusting our own ways and looking to the world for answers on how to live best. Like Ahaz, we need to be reminded that actions have consequences, that what you sow is what you reap, and that obedience brings blessing and disobedience brings sorrow.

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
