



Jehoahaz, Jehoiakim, Jehoiachin: Despise not the Chastening of the Lord

Lesson 21

...My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of him: For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth.

Hebrews 12:5-6

It's counterintuitive, but when we are disciplined by the Lord we ought to humbly accept whatever is coming our way from His hand.

Jehoahaz – The Prelude to Captivity (2 Kings 23:31-35)

Although Jehoahaz's wicked reign was cut short, his brother Eliakim, whose name was changed to Jehoiakim, was just as wicked.

Jehoiakim – The First Babylonian Wave (2 Kings 23:36-24:6)

Judah refused to accept the discipline of the Lord, and because they rebelled twice against Babylon, the attacks came in three waves.

I. Jehoiakim and Pharaoh

A. Pharaoh _____ Jehoiakim.

Pharaoh would make Jehoiakim king, and Jehoiakim would send taxes to Pharaoh.

II. Jehoiakim and Jeremiah

A. Jehoiakim _____ a prophet of the Lord (Jeremiah 26:20-23).



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III. Jehoiakim and Babylon

A. God brings _____ to Judah (2 Kings 24:1-2).

B. God's _____ for bringing chastening to Judah (2 Kings 24:3-4).

It was the murder of Naboth that led to God's pronouncement of judgment on Ahab, and it was the innocent lives of many who brought God's judgment upon Judah.

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Jehoiachin – The Second Babylonian Wave

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Like his grandfather, a ruler who only rules for three months somehow still manages to go down as a wicked ruler.

II. Jehoiachin and Nebuchadnezzar (2 Kings 24:10-17).
